## Congerstone from 1086 to 2019

The meaning behind the name: 'The king's estate' derived from the old Danish/Scandinavian 'kunung / konungr' meaning 'a king'.

Congerstone was thought to be an Anglo-Saxon royal manor seized by the Danes in about 877.

These are variations in spelling found in manuscripts, rent rolls, deeds etc since 1086. The name of the village as spelled today was first used in the late 16<sup>th</sup> century but was only used consistently from the middle to late 19<sup>th</sup> century.
